A 'HIGHER AUTHORITY' had directed that demolition of the Belle Vue begin e day morning, a Works Department spokesman said last night.

He said this direction was given after last Wednesday's joint Government parties meeting, but would not confirm or deny that the higher authority was the Premier (Mr. Bjelke-Petersen),

The spokesman said that it had still been the Works Department's decision to go ahead with the demolition on Saturday.

In conjunction with the contractor, it was decided to start on Saturday so traffic would not be inconvenienced.

Demolition of the Belle Vue continued yesterday as Mr. Bjelke-Petersen accused Liberal MPs who opposed the action, as 'pathetic'.

In other developments yesterday, the State beral Member for Stafford (Mr. Gygar) claimed the demolition contractor, Sim Enterprises, contravened the Construction Safety Act.

He said windows had not been removed and the doors were not boarded up.

A 'catch cradle' was required for the rubble, but had not been built. A safety zone one and a half times the height of the building should have been established.

Mr. Gygar said last night that Members had left the joint parties with the impression that the facade of the Belle Vue was to be saved and used as a front on another building on the same site.

'Vandalism'

Brisbane City Council planning and traffic committee chairman (Alderman Ardill) said the 'vandalism' had wrecked thousands of dollars worth of traffic control equipment.

Alderman Ardill said that a wall of the Belle Vue had fallen on a traffic installation that would put out the traffic lights for several days at the corner of Alice and George Streets and other nearby intersections.

The Town Clerk would be seeking compensation for the traffic installation and parking meters smashed.

Another Liberal backbencher, Mr. Akers (Pine Rivers criticised the Premier over the demolition during a party conference.

Mr. Bjelke-Petersen said yesterday from his Kingaroy home that he wanted to congratulate the demolition contractor for a job well done.

He would not discuss details of tenders for the job but said all normal procedures had been complied with. Mr. Bjelke-Petersen also defended the 1 a.m. Saturday start and said it was wise to get started then, so traffic was not blocked.

'Edwards signed'

He said that the Deputy Premier and Liberal leader (Dr. Edwards) had signed the document which led to the Belle Vue's destruction.

Mr. Bjelke-Petersen said he was 'not interested' in the regulations. The demolishers were skilled in their work and knew what rules they had to obey.

"Everyone knew it was going to be demolished what irritates me is the pathetic way people behaved over it," Mr. Bjelke-Petersen said.

"After being party to the decision, they have run away from it. What a laughing stock I would be if I ran away from the decision.

"I like people who stick and have backbone and courage.

Mr. Bjelke-Petersen said tenders had been called last Thursday afternoon after the joint par-



ties meeting. He said that only three Liberals opposed the decision at the meeting.

The Works Department spokesman said last night the demolition contract had not been advertised publicly. Quotes had been invited by phone on Thursday afternoon following Wednesday's joint parties meeting. This was normal procedure. Three quotes had been received and Sims, the

successful tenderer had charged \$40,000. "All Acts, By Laws or regulations were observed by the Works Department. There is no evidence that the contractor broke any laws," the spokesman said.

Insurance

The spokesman added that any claims for damage were a matter for the contractor. He had taken out insurance to cover this.

In Maleny yesterday Mr. Akers (Lib, Pine Rivers) said he was still thinking about leaving the Liberal Party after the Belle Vue decision.

He said the Liberal Party executive and leadership had to do something about restoring democratic government in the State.

He was speaking to an urgency motion passed by the Liberal Party Fisher area conference.

The motion condemned the "underhand methods" by which the Belle Vue demolition was achieved. It said it was another example of the "despotism" of the Premier and his lack of compliance with the coalition agreement,

The State Liberal Parliamentary leader (Dr. Edwards) said last night the sudden demolition of the Belle Vue had caused unhappiness in the Liberal Party, but he said none of his colleagues would resign.
