TECHNICIAN TITBITS

by D. Aberdeen

To answer Brenden of Beaudesert, using a coaxial lead between antennae and tuner may improve your reception to some degree (not forgetting the 300 ohm to 75 ohm BALON at the antennae end if using a TV antennae) but also give your antennae as much height as possible. As for higher power transmissions, we are working on it.

Whilst on antennaes, never! connect an FM tuner and a TV in parallel to the lead from the antennae. Always use a SIGNAL SPLITTER, available from most shops selling electronic components. Parallel connection will result in "ghosting" on the TV and distorted stereo reception.

If anyone has any questions on antennaes, tuners etc. feel free to write and I shall attempt to answer in the next RADIO TIMES.

REEK WEST SHOW



Welcome back my friends to the shower that never bends ladeez and gennelmen the Request show column.

In this thrill packed episode our heroine is confiscated by the authorities and our hero is constipated by the majorities; a huge chunk of space rock threatens to pull the earth out of its orbit and into the Suns gravitational field; a radio personality denies everything accepts no blame or responsibility; a midget with 18 fingers declared the worlds smallest fiddler and classified as a fidget; bad two line jokes are used to fill Radio Times Meanwhile somewhere in Mainland China a grieving mother mourns the loss of her son and ponders the ways of life... Back in the States Helen tells Max she is pregnant. But who is the father?...Whilst in the middle of outback Australia one impoverished graziers' most treasured pet, Blue, their sheepdog, is chasing a rabbit round and round an 8 track mixer when he stubs his paw on a gold ingot and says "Oww Woof! Woof!" His doting master, ever a gentleman, shouts "Shut your trap you mangy mongrel or I'll put a bullet through you"... Why does Heinrich want to know helga's shoe size? What does he use the mysterious metal device for? ... Who is "Bottlemeck

Bimbo" and why does he want to set up the worlds largest two-up school in a nuclear submarine that constantly cruises round Sydney Harbour at sppeds in excess of Mark II?

All these questions and more are not even vaguely touched upon by the rest of this boring item. Take the glitter and sparkle out of your eyes, we must get down to the mundane business of request show reportage. Well that just about wraps up the reporting of good developments, the next hundert lines report the bad news.

Seriously though folks enough of this self-depreciation; false modesty just isn't my style.

As the dedicated listeners will have realised funny voices are out and pre-pubescent humour is in. It appears that vocal tricks went down like a pork sausage at a Jewish wedding. Hence they were off like Harrys' knickers (sexist pig) and back came the improbably normal (if nasal) voice featuring jokes that laid them in aisles back in India in 1932 (if they were suitably drunk).

Some other nasties have raised their ugly heads in the last few weeks, the problem of musical inconsistency being one. Because of the wide range of listener taste, preference and or mood, to which you must add the ten thousand or so tracks we could possibly play for them, if one plays the requested tracks on the exact order that they come through to the switchboard, you are likely to have a Status quo followed by a Joan Baez. Led Zeppelin, Bad Company and Deep Purple are basically incompatible with the likes of Leonard Cohen, Rory Previn, Roy Harper and a wealth of material from the likes of Bob Dylan, Ry Cooder, Jimmy Buffet, David Bowie etc. The answer might be for my goodself to start modulating the musical accent of the show (that means match the tracks - heavy heavy, hard rock, normal rock graduating down to melodic rock and acoustic stuff and then picking up the tempo again). This does however mean that your track may not get played in the order which it is phoned in (that may be a boon or a

The second problem of the show is that of request hogging - people who ring in sometimes 4 times a night to request songs. I feel that the answer is for me to prune their budding programming instincts i.e. to play one or at most two of their requests (that'll happen if I like the second one) may as well add a bit of taste and judgement to the show. Just thought you'd like to know that I was getting more authoritarian about the request situation in case you're a multi-request person - make sure they're good.

It also occurs to me that the fact we have only one phone being answered is a disadvantage in that the persons with more patience than taste wait until their ring is answered, for hours they'll hang on to the phone to place their juvenile request, whereas persons who have genuine musical percep-

August 3 - This month having 5 tuesdays, and it being difficult to think up new approaches for every night, this Tuesday night is hereby proclaimed Nothin' Special, and is a good chance to catch up on some black american culture.

August 10 - Even though Australia never sees any, new blues records are constantly being released in America and England and even some other places in the world. Amazing! We'll take a look at these, including the new Hound Dog Taylor LP and some new Japanese releases. Japan, incidentally, is starting to show a lot of interest in blues, which is very interesting considering the different languages and cultures involved.

August 17 - R and B - Rhythm and Blues, represents the border between blues and rock in many respects, and on this evening no slow dirges are to be played. If rock's great contribution to Western music is rhythm, then this surely came from Blues, via R and B. Blues in its turn represents the african influence on Western music a century before the term afro-rock was invented. Bring blue suede shoes and bobby sox.

August 24 - A general look around.

August 31 - An hour of country blues, and its influences.

Australian Blues is concentrated, as far as live music goes, in Sydney. Three bands are currently working there, and the best of these is the Foreday Riders. They play on Thursday nights at French's Wine Bar. Other band working include Son Hopkins R and R Four, - an Excello based sound, and Junior and the Gold Tops, for Little Walter style blues.

Australia also boasts an Australian Blues Society, which puts out an excellent quarterly journal which is a steal at \$4.00 a year. Information about A.B.S. can be obtained from Greg Cuffe, c/- Bradley Avenue, Kedron 4031, or phone 576046. A stamped self-addressed envelope would be appreciated if writing.

Dear Subscriber,

The bleary-eyed Triplezed news empire has entered the world of twentieth century technology and science with a vengeance.

We have acquired our long awaited telephone interface, the device that allows the re-broadcasting of phone interviews on air. So, the news bulletins have begun to fill up with voice cuts from pollies and people in the news generally. The interface is also affecting programming in toto. All on-air shows will contain more talks with personalities, as it makes it so much easier to locate and talk to people. Interstate and maybe international (depending on the state of liver of our financial co-ordinator) interviews are easily churned out.

Our other acquisition is the YAESUMUSEN FRG-7 short wave communications receiver. This device utilises the "Wadley hoop System" (that means it offers unparalleled stable performance) and covers the entire high frequency spectrum 500 KHZ to 29.9 MHZ. We will now be able' to monitor overseas news and information broadcasts from Europe, Asia, America, Africa and present listeners with the latest first. No other Brisbane stations monitor overseas news services.

Coupled with our air-mail subscriptions to foreign publications, normally unavailable in Brisbane, for example the New York Radical Guardian, the Peoples News Service from London, the newsletter "Eolas" (the Irish Repulican Movement's publication sent from Dublin), ZZZ is now capable of broadcasting a great deal of alternate overseas news. The question is: do you want to hear it, in what quantities, from which countries, in how much depth, and at what time of the day?? Suggestions from listeners are welcome.

ZZZ has advertised in The Courier-Mail for a full-time paid journalist. This means we are expanding the staff for the production of current affairs and news material.

On top of this, we need volunteers to assist on news shifts. We also need people to help out for live on-air talkback. Four news bulletins, plus headlines, plus snippets, plus answering the phone, plus organising the talkback facilities, plus keeping sane and making coffee is quite an effort for one journalist in the John Woods Breakfast show. It is necessary for the journalist to begin working at 5.30 in the morning. If you can come out and give us a hand, you'll never look back.

Journalism students have already obtained a lot of experience working with us. You can increase your typing speed, learn everything you've always wanted to know about tape editing, voice overs and so on, as well as learning about how politics actually operates and what actually happens in politics (as apart from the finithed product as it appears in the media). If you can help in the brekky show or through the day, give a ZZZ journalist a ring on 371 1459.

You might listen to John Woods on the radio at 7am, but unless you're in the studio with him, you'll never know what a cantankerous, loud mouthed, unshaven bastard he really is.

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
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

MEDI COST

DOCTORS WHO BULK BILL

Mediban is now a household word. So is money. We at ZZZ often wondered why none of the local media have bothered to do a survey of which G.P.'s bulk bill their patients. We decided to do our own survey. Bulk billing is when the patient pays nothing after a consultation sessions with their doctor. The doctor sends the bill to Medibank and receives back 85% of the consultation fee. All other Medibank alternatives involve some sort of payment directly by the patient, then usually a partial reimbursement from Medibank.



We sampled 268 general practitioners from the entire Brisbane metropolitan area, and it was a well-represented cross-section. We found that: 8% Bulk bill (24) 28% bulk bill pensioners and dving patients only (74)

28% bulk bill pensioners and dying patients only (74) 64% don't bulk bill (170)

Here is the list of general practitioners we sampled who bulk bill in the Brisbane Metropolitan area:

MAYBE YOULL HEAR FROM US AGAIN SOON. (TO CONGRATULATE YOU. WE HOPE).

Dear Frustrated FM Fanatics,

I don't quite know how to go about delivering a scathing reply to the above. Basically, I don't think the function of a breakfast show (FM or AM) is to provide music ina context of listening closely, or becoming involved in the music. In fact, you best make my point for me when you say, "HOW MANY PEOPLE DO YOU THINK HAVE THE TIME TO BE SITTING BY THEIR FM AND TAPE RECORDERS AT THAT TIME OF THE MORNING?? EVERYONE I KNOW IS FLAT OUT GETTING TO WORK ON TIME."

That really is my whole argument. Whatever is being broadcast during a breakfast show is equal parts background and more or less essential information, such as news, weather and time calls. Surely most people are far too preoccupied to be offended by voices intruding over an introduction. We don't exactly indulge in what I presume you people would call "hype". We aren't trying to sell anything. We're only attempting to provide a service.

In the past one of the most constant criticisms we received was that Triple Zed might be great for music, but no-one listened to the breakfast show becase the tracks were mostly too long and you never heard the time and only heard weather details with the news. So now we have three hours crammed with news, time calls, alternating detailed weather reports and brief weather comments. News in brief as well as halfhourly news.

The overall station music policy no longer applies to the breakfast show, most of the music I play is very Top 40 oriented, especially with regard to "oldies". Whereas before this change I was fitting between 20 and 30 tracks into three hours, since the change I've played as many as 46. Obviously, in this situation we are putting out a

lot more information, achieving a greater level of variety and hence, hopefully, pleasing the optimum number of people. It was never assumed that we'd captivate everyone. Yours is the first complaint we've had of a serious nature, but a lot of people have commented on the improvement, and most people mention at the same time that they wouldn't like us to adhere to the same format outside of the breakfast show. As far as your comments about taping are concerned, quite probably a large percentage of our audience do tape off the air. I'm led to believe that it is illegal to do so. The law to one side, I have seen a commercial on television for a certain oriental brand of FM tuner/ record player/cassette deck which specifies that their machine can tape from the turntable or "straight from the radio".

I would have thought that people such as yourselves (I understand that you are an employee of a well-known international record company of Anglo-Saxon origins) would have been hotly opposed to the idea of music being taped from the radio. Personally, I would loathe to encourage anyone to break the law, so I'll refrain from making public my opinions on this crucial issue of taping. I can, however, assure all of our listeners that at no stage have we even fleetingly considered taking steps to interfere with anyone's desire to tape.

Finally, seeing that you brought up the issue of the "state of-the-art" with regard to FM broadcasting, how about the state-of-the-art of recording. There are a couple of artists who are distributed by your company (which shall, I assure you, remain nameless) that I wouldn't mind having a chat with you about.

NEWS

One of the wonderful things about Australia's free enterprise system, we are told, is that the best possible results from any given situation are forged in the white heat of business competition. But sadly this isn't always the case. Take commercial radio news in Brisbane for example. With five competing commercial stations in the one city, you'd expect some hardhitting reporting as the clear eyed media entrepeneurs struggle for the top ratings and judiest advertising accounts.

In fact it's quite the opposite.

All five radio stations (commercial) in Brisbane get their news from precisely the same place - Australia's international newsagency, Australian Associated Press. All of them are plugged into a special newsfeed which churns out radio style stories ready to be ripped off and read on air.

The Old component of the newsfeed is produced by 5 journalists at A-A-P's Brisbane bureau which is based at the Old Newspapers building at Bowen Hills. These journalists have access to Courier Mail and Telegraph copy before it goes to press and use it to produce the bulk of their radio copy. They also pick up their own stories through telephone rounds. On the really important stories, they have been known to appear in person to get first hand account of what is going on. It follows that A-A-P relies heavily on the Courier Mail/Telegraph for indepth reporting. It also follows that they very seldom get it.

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All these radio style stories are pumped down a telex to A-A-P's Australian headquarters - a vast clicking, whiring, computer ridden rabbit warren called Macquarie House, just a stone's throw from the old Sydney markets. Somewhere in this twenty four hour news factory is a radio sub-editor who checks the Old copy and has it led into a computer. The computer mixes the Old stories with substantial dollops of international news and stories from other states and bangs it all back up the line to the Brisbane radio stations.

The stations then somewhat erraticly select stories to go to air. Although all of the stations have people who are styled as news editors - directors, most of them don't bother to employ journalists - they have announcers. Journalists, for all their other failings, are well organ - ised and as a result demand high pay and conditions. On the other hand, announcers aren't usually in unions, are poorly paid and could be easily replaced. 4KQ, which is owned by the Labor Party and which boasts "more news", doesn't employ a single journalist. The Qld newspaper owned 4BK, which still claims it gets its news "from the worldwide sources of the Courier Mail and Telegraph" also has no journalists on its staff.

Even when journalists are employed they don't have it easy. A junior executive on one Brisbane station had the bright idea that there would be all of publicity for the station if it staged an elaborate hoax on April Fool's day.

The executive wanted to broadcast bogus news items saying that an aircraft had crashed into a mountain near the centre of Brisbane. He wanted these false items mixed in with genuine stories in the station's news bulletins. The journalist in charge of the station's news-room refused to do this on ethical grounds. He was threatened with immediate dismissal if he did not comply.

The journalist contacted the Australian Journalists
Association which was understandably angry. The
AJA intervened ... the bogus stories were broadcast
after, but not in the news bulletins and the journalist
was demoted but not sacked.

Another Brisbane station take the A-A-P copy and rewrites it in its own curious, pop-slang radio style. So, while the stories on the other stations are third or fourth hand by the time they go to air (person involved-Brisbane Telegraph - Brisbane A-A-P - Sydney A-A-P - Brisbane Radio Station Announcer), this particular station has the distinction of broadcasting fourth or fifth hand stories. Needless to say many of these are often more than a little removed from what actually happened.
