I'm another year on the belt and I'll have another belt over here than's bartender," Michael Finman at Bunana Awards.

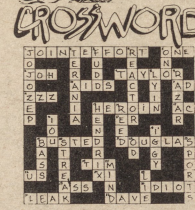
Yep, we've made it through to 1981. We'd like to thank all those who wish us well on December 8, the occasion of our fifth birthday. We'd especially congratulate Telecom on their brilliant timing, when they lobbed a back-bell on us for power used at Mt. Cootha—the over the past two years. Shared between us and 4MBS it came to around \$10,000. Nasty but unavoidable.

Actually it was quite an achievement to make it through to '81. We practically ran out of money last August, but the generosity of you subscribers together with that of Q.L.T. Union (\$5,000) and the opening of the National Hotel as a rock venue, helped carry us through. The new year presents new problems though. Hopefully Q.T.U. will come to our aid again. Uni. of Q.L.D. Union are currently determining just how much money they think Triple Zed will need this year. Unfortunately, Triple Zed and the National Hotel have parted ways. The new owners put it in a proposal, but it was just not on. So the venue search continues. Meanwhile Joint Efforts will be the mainstay of the station's promotional team for the next couple of months. ## TRIBUNAL SUPPORTS FREE SPEECH

AUSTRALIAN BROADCASTING TRIBUNAL

Dear Mr. Thompson

I refer to my letter of 31 October 1980 and the meeting between yourself and the Tribunal on 18 November 1980.

The Tribunal has noted your letter of 18 November containing an addendum, a correction and several points of clarification relating to the draft notes of the meeting on 18 November. The Tribunal's decision on this matter is as follows:

In its letter of 11 October the Tribunal gave notice of its concerns about several instances of allegedly obscene program material broadcast by station 4ZZZ and particularly the program "The Bait" broadcast between 7.00 pm and 7.30 pm on 11 August 1980. Attention was particularly drawn to section 113 of the Act in relation to the broadcast of obscene material and which constitutes a contravention of the station's licence.

As you were advised in the letter of 31 October and at the meeting the Tribunal was concerned that these instances indicated a tendency of irresponsibility and lack of regard for the protection of the broadcasting community and the public interest.

The Tribunal was assisted in its consideration of this matter by the fact and frank discussion at the meeting which was also attended by Mr. Michael Law from the Public Broadcasting Association. In particular it was noted that both you and Mr. Law agreed that the Tribunal's decision was a necessary and specific audience needed to be taken into account (particularly university students) and the program would not be offensive to the public. The program was not obscene or contrary to section 113 of the Act and was entirely a serious and proper treatment of the subject matter as contemplated by paragraph 4 of the Broadcasting Program Standards.

The Tribunal has reassessed this matter in the light of the comments made at the meeting and further evidence. It would appear that the particular program, as indicated to you and the Tribunal, was not a contravention of the Act. The Tribunal considers that the text would not have been offensive to persons who accept this subject as a legitimate matter for discussion. It is also noted that although the treatment was often light and humorous the language used was quite general and at times clinical and not explicit. The Tribunal is satisfied that the program was not intended to offend or to cause offence and that the Tribunal's decision is a necessary and specific audience needed to be taken into account (particularly university students) and the program would not be offensive to the public. The program was not obscene or contrary to section 113 of the Act and was entirely a serious and proper treatment of the subject matter as contemplated by paragraph 4 of the Broadcasting Program Standards.

Although it is apparent that such research went into the selection of the subject, it did cause the Tribunal concern as the lyrics of the songs played were repetitious and vulgar. The Tribunal considers that the text would not have been offensive to persons who accept this subject as a legitimate matter for discussion. It is also noted that although the treatment was often light and humorous the language used was quite general and at times clinical and not explicit. The Tribunal is satisfied that the program was not intended to offend or to cause offence and that the Tribunal's decision is a necessary and specific audience needed to be taken into account (particularly university students) and the program would not be offensive to the public. The program was not obscene or contrary to section 113 of the Act and was entirely a serious and proper treatment of the subject matter as contemplated by paragraph 4 of the Broadcasting Program Standards.

## EARWITNESS NEWS 4ZZZ

### QUOTES FROM THE NEWSROOM

"No I'm not bitter, Rosalynn is, but I'm not!"... Jimmy Carter, after losing his job.

"With jelly beans, there can be a lot to tell a fellow's character. There are those who just pick out one colour and those who grab a handful." Ronald Reagan, explaining why he plans to keep a jar of jelly beans in the Cabinet Room.

"I mean that they were quite good stockmen and good horsemen. I've been in camps that contained aborigines and mostly they used to be anyway, fairly good horsemen." Queensland's new Minister for Aboriginal Affairs, when asked to explain what he meant when he said he had had a bit of experience in the past with aborigines and had found them "quite good".

Shorty O'Neil from the North Queensland Land's Council, explaining what Australia Day means to him as an aborigine. "Most aboriginal people feel it as a day of mourning, because it represents the day that whites came to Australia and forcibly stole our land. Its celebrated by white Australians as a day of rejoicing, to us it's a day of hopelessness. In the first hundred years of white occupation on the land, nine tenths of our people were murdered, or slaughtered, and those figures are there for anybody to see. White fellows reckoned there were three hundred thousand aboriginal people in Australia when they first came here, when they were shipping us onto reserves a hundred years later there were only thirty three thousand aboriginal people left".

This exchange took place during the hearing into Rupert Murdoch's takeover bid for Channel Ten, which involved Murdoch first acquiring Ansett Airlines. The person being questioned is Murdoch's solicitor, Martin Cooper.

"In other words, Sir Peter Ablees does not know anything really about running a television station, does he?" Cooper: "No, well, he is learning."

And also during the hearing, there was this exchange between Rupert Murdoch and A.L.P. Q.C. Alistair Nicholson. Nicholson: "There is a distinction, I suppose you would agree, between behaving in a manner that is right and proper, and behaving in a manner which is proper and the law." Murdoch: "You mean that it is possible to be lawful but not right and proper?" Nicholson: "Indeed, I suppose I could imagine such circumstances."

# THE HOT 100

From the time when the first few Hot Hundred entries began bombarding Triple Zed, it was obvious a mistake had been made. It had all seemed like a good idea to begin, to find out what music Triple Zed listeners REALLY liked. Few people around the station were involved with the first Hot Hundred, and no-one had any idea how much work it would take.

Think about it. Say 100 entries of 100 songs, that's 10,000 songs to collate. And Triple Zed doesn't have an IBM computer. I was emotionally crippled after collating 10 of the bastards. And Neil was the next casualty. Then we tried collective efforts and confusion reigned. Jo Forsyth and Karen Reid were two of the Great Heroes of the Hot Hundred collating team.

By the time we were really sick of the whole thing, the entries really began pouring in. It is interesting to note why people sent in entries. Most seemed to be motivated by an altruistic urge to see certain songs hit the top. For instance, Donna Wright who voted for "Come Around" by Mental as Anything 100 times. (Unfortunately disallowed by the judges). And many entrants did not identify themselves, so they obviously weren't interested in the fabulous array of prizes.

Actually the final Hot Hundred was a bit of a surprise. There were some glaring omissions. For instance Roxy Music and Van Morrison; and to see so little Graham Parker caused me more than a moment's grief. But even more ludicrous was the emphasis on some bands; the Cure are a great band but 3 songs in the Hot Hundred seems a bit much; the Beatles only had one and that was 93.

It was heartening to see such a poor showing from the dinosaur groups. Even "Stairway to Heaven" by Led Zeppelin (remember them?) had slipped to No. 25. And Pink Floyd was nowhere to be seen. Australian groups put in a strong showing with 16 songs in the Hot Hundred including golden oldies "Friday on My Mind" by the Easybeats (No. 23 and No. 3 in the Oz stakes) and "Eagle Rock" by Daddy Cool (41 and 7). Brisbane held its own with the assistance of the Saints ("I'm Stranded" was 10 and 1), the Ripstix ("The Grobets and Razz" you're a faithful lot).

But let's face it New Years Day belonged to the Sex Pistols. With three songs in the top ten they were way out in front. "Anarchy in the U.K." really is the anthem of a generation. But with the Sex Pistols extinct for three years now, I hope they're soundly beaten next time.

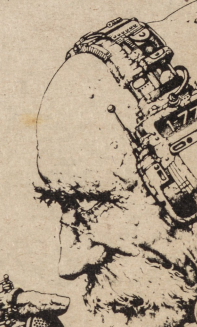
