AN INTERVIEW WITH GLENYS, MICHELLE, ROSS AND GREG ABOUT MURRI RADIO. DONE AT THE ABORIGINAL AND ISLANDER CHILDCARE AGENCY. BY NANCY WESTERMAN

Q: HOW HAS THE RADIO BEEN USEFUL IN THE MURRI COMM-

Just as a community service it gives a platform, a place for ROSS: community news, community events. We don't have to hassle around with the commercial people or we don't have to be at the mercy of whoever else is putting a programme together on their interpretations ; or their time slots or their resources. It's something that we tried to set up so it belongs to the community. It's a community service for people in the community who have things to say, whether it's news/events/or

Q: DO YOU FIND ALOT OF PEOPLE ARE INTERESTED NOW, COMPARED TO SIX MONTHS AGO? AND THAT IT'S TALKED ABOUT IN THE COMMUNITY?

MICHELLE: Yeah, It is. Because on Tuesday nights friends come out and they say 'such and such said' - and they just talk about the show and wish they were there sometimes and they find out that they can come out. N (LAUGHTER) More people listen to it - you say 'from ear to ear'.

GLENYS: We say something on Saturday that we forgot and they'll remind us - 'oh you said this and you said that......' ROSS: Yean and just like the other night hose two fellas from Strad-

COSS: Yean and just like the other hight those two fellas from Strad-broke - it was good them coming out. They have been ringing in for about a year or more. Q: DO YOU THINK THAT MORE PEOPLE ARE BRINGING NOTICES ABOUT THINGS AND STORIES FOR YOU TO PUT ON AIR?

GLENYS: Yeah, what I do is go around to agencies or just see people on the street - someone might recognize one of us and tell us what's going on. ROSS: We're still getting calls and people sending stuff in.

Q: DO YOU THINK THAT HAVING RADIO, AS WELL AS THE PAPER AND CENTRE, LIKE CHILDCARE, THAT YOU CAN ES-TABLISH MORE UNITY IN THE COMMUNITY

ROSS: I'm not sure whether it's a matter of establishing unity. I think it's just a matter of getting the community to recognize Murri time as the community resource. You see then it doesn't matter how the time's used, providing the community is using it the way they want to. That's what we are trying to do - to get the community to use the time. In the meantime we're hoping with trainees at the station we're going In the meantime we're hoping with trainees at the station we're going to put a bit of order into our programming. We'd like to have the kids come out from the schools, ten minutes a week or maybe twenty minutes a month or something. We'd like to have some of the different groups form the college (Kangaroo Point) Ed. to have them come out and do a programme. Just that sort of thing. The unity part is just, I think, that our people are doing the time. We're sort of learning how to work amongst ourselves. If people aren't available we've got people to back up and to come in and do the programme. And it's also put us in touch with Greg out there at 4ZZZ - that's pretty good for us because it gives us a bit more of a presence at the station. NANCY: I noticed it was easier for those guys to come in and talk to

NANCY: I noticed it was easier for those guys to come in and talk to you and find out they could relax there and that. They felt a bit shy about talking to others.

GREG: I felt really good when they came out. MICHELLE: One thing about the radio - people listening want to come aught them to panel. When they do come out we say - yeah we can do some of the show and they do it - especially on Tuesday nights. 'Cause we had a couple of boys from Normanby Tce and everywhere, heh, it's really good.... ROSS: With some of the young people it's just a matter of giving them

time to get used to just sitting on the panel and stuff like that. That takes a little bit with some people..... but I don't know, we've put). a lot of different people on there. So those sort of basic skills are build-

Q: HAVE YOU HAD MANY REACTIONS FROM THE WHITE AUDIENCE - GOOD OR BAD

AUDIENCE - GOOD OR BAD (LAUGHTER) GLENYS: I dunno - on Saturday mornings when we do the show some people do ring. I suppose because it's a popular listening time not only for our own but for the wider community, we do get calls from people wanting a different type of music or something. Last Saturday someone rung me up three times and I tried to explain to him - 'it's people wanting a different type of music or something. Last Saturday someone rung me up three times and I tried to explain to him - 'it's Murri music' - he was very rude so I got on the panel and said 'I'm sorry we bore you but we're going to bore you for another hour and a half, sorry this is Murri time'. You know I didn't mean to be rude to him - it's just that it's hard to know what to say. ROSS: We get the crank calls - people just want to ring up and come out with their bits of abuse and things like that.

GLENYS: But the funny thing about Saturday was that Murris rung up and said - 'is that the Murri hour' - 'cause we'd played some songs for the kids (they like a bit of disco) - it's strange that this guy rung in and said that there's too much Murri music.

ROSS: I think the fact that we are still getting phone calls from asking for other music shows they're listening. The fact is that we try to cater to that and I think it's O.K. because a lot of Murris ring up and ROSS: ask for different types of songs, too. GLENYS: Some that I've never heard of!

GLENYS: Some that I've never heard of! Q: DO YOU SEE IT AS AN EDUCATION PROCESS? ROSS: As far as education the listeners - yeah - I think that's sort of seen as something we'd like to do. It's like the newspaper but we don't sort of put anything political into it - it's the same with the radio programme. There is a danger that we can start talking at people too much and make people feel uncomfortable, rather than get them to feel more comfortable just about Murri and about what we're talking about and about how we re trying to relate to each other. much and make people feel uncomfortable, rather than get them to feel more comfortable just about Murri and about what we're talking about and about how we.re trying to relate to each other. I think that comes through and I think also about how we're trying to relate to people that are listening and the things we are trying to relate. I think those sort of things are going to come - the education part of it all will be a lot easier once people don't feel so threatened. Even from our own mob - if they can sit down and listen to a programme and enjoy the music, listen to the birthday calls and listen to their cousin/friend talking on the radio, you know. People will become less threatened...... GLENYS: Just like now I turn on ZZZ and I turn on the Blues/black-beat..... you know I don't ring up and say 'Why don't you play some Murri music. Something different!' MICHELLE: We've had a couple of white people come out (we don't call them white people - we call them migaloo - so whenever you hear us say migaloo.....). Like this one time, this guy came into the radio station, someone who works there and did a poem about landrights and, he.was, reading it and it was really good to see someone eise come in, especially from a migaloo's point of view. GLENYS: He just asked if he could read the poem over so we let him. MICHEEL: It was really good - he wanted to play Furious Turtles or something underneath - came out O.K, but. GREG: Yeah - alot more than it was in the beginning. MICHELE: There's this one guy who comes up and says 'hello Bosh!' (mate) Ed, and we say 'hello Bosh!' And they some of our words too - it's really good - Saying some of our inngo, that's what it is. ROSS: I think we feel alot more comfortable at the station how than we did two years ago or even twelve months ago. Yeah it's got alot more relaxed now.

more relaxed now. MICHELLE: It used to seem there was a barrier between black and white and now the walls have been knocked down gradually and it's really good

ROSS It's sort of - as we said before - it's a slow process for us to learn alot of things about maintaining the equipment, looking after the stylus and those sort of things, but I mean we're still trying to tell people how to live in this country - not to hurt the land. And it's 200 years now and people are still destroying the land. There is a cultural gap there, you know although it's not such a so

know, although it's not such a gap. NANCY: Takes people a long time to appreciate another culture. GREG: Yeah, when I first came in, there were a few people freaked out

by me. But now people just look at me and it's just Greg - one of the mob.

ROSS: Maybe Michelle would like to talk about how Saturday mornings are going - with the kids - that started Friday nights prerecorded, heh . How long did that go for

How long did that go for MICHELLE: It's been for about six months. We used to bring stacks of kids out. We only used to be able to bring <u>out</u> a couple of people but was still more that wanted to come. That's why we do it on a Saturday morning so the kids can come out, or so more kids can just pop in or ring up or whatever. Lots of people ring up and usually we have to play one song for about three different people. And when we play all these songs we haven't got enough time - it really gets hectic, heh, really wild.

GLENYS: Same as when we started on the elders show on the Saturday, but it's hard for the elders to get in so we were hoping to switch over to another time so they can come in too. They're willing to come in on a Monday, say. Q: WHEN DID YOU DO THE PRERECORDED SHOW

GLENYS: We stopped doing that when they started fixing up the studio. MICHELLE: It was O. K. but now more people can come out, anyone, and its not stopping the ones who wanted to come out but couldn't. It's easier and it sounds better - everyone enjoys it more and it sounds better live. Everyone jumping in and doing something - where before it sounded like you had to sort of slot it and it didn't sound as natural. People sort of like it more now- people laugh and you can tell people are

enjoying themselves. Q: WELL, THAT BRINGS US TO ANOTHER THING - DO YOU WANT TO EXPLAIN THE DIFFERENCES BETWEEN THE THREE SHIFTS

GLENYS: We're trying to make it a little bit more constructive but we don't go by any guidelines.. We go with how it comes. It used to be the elders show on Saturdays but there might be only one elder there and we might do an interview, then it might turn into a request show. There's no guidlines really.

ROSS: Same as Mondays - supposed to be a landrights programme. We were going to try and make it a landrights update thing from news clippings and such, but alot of their clippings aren't worth talking about; although maybe we could intensify that a bit. Could spend ten to fifteen minutes and just go through them of something like that. But you see Barbara's coming out now on Mondays and she's probably going to do something else with that time so on paper it probably will still be called the landrights programme but it might develop into something else and the landrights programme but it might develop into something else and maybe the women might be taking some of that time over. Maybe the school will be taking over some of it. So I'm not sure what we'll call it then. But it's still Murri time. And Tuesday nights is more just requests and community notices and stuff, events coming up for the weekend. GLENYS: All depends on who we get in there - might be someone who wants to talk about landrights or there'll be someone who wants to talk

Q: DO YOU THINK 4ZZZ IS VERY OPEN TO DIFFERENT GROUPS HAVING ACCESS LIKE YOU'VE HAD ACCESS DO YOU THINK THAT IT WORKS VERY WELL AT THE STATION (LAUGHTER) ROSS: I think 4 ZZZ's learnt a bit in the time we've been there - from us.

We learn a bit about you too. I don't think anybody has any bad feelings - like at the last meeting I don't think anyone felt particularly threatened none of the Murris anyway.

GLENYS: We can understand where you're coming from but you can't always understand where we're coming from.

You see our thing is that people are important and that's how ROSS: You see our thing is that people are important and that's how we relate and how we work out what's important and if the equipment gets looked after in the process that's really good but I mean - it's not that there's a disrespect for equipment it's just that people are more important. I think that things are going along O.K. I reckon I feel O.K. about it. We did somethings for the programme too - when we first started the Tuesday night shifts - after a month there was a big party there with 50/60 people coming out in taxl loads plus with slx packs in their hands and people having a really good rage there and it was good but after it started getting out of hand a bit, when it went long enough, we sort of slowed it down and the community's come along with that. ROSS: And as it is now - once every month or so there'll still be people turning up in carloads with a carton of booze and stuff and having a good time. It's not as if it only happens one way, with one format. And if a couple of carloads turn up and they have a part in the programme well that's

GLENYS: Then they know we are part of the community - we're not just up there saying that we run the show you know - but it's them too. Sort of a slow process for some people to understand but it hasn't been really that slow for us - it's been moving quite fast as far as the radio goes. We try to teach the young ones respect for the station. Now and then they might forget.

MICHELLE: They know now and it's really good. Q: DO YOU THINK THAT THERE WILL COME A TIME IN THE NEAR FUTURE THAT YOU'LL HAVE YOUR OWN RADIO STATION OR PRODUCTION STUDIO

ROSS: Yeah, we're hoping. MICHELLE: I think so because there's so many young people who come out there, they really want to do the show and they really feel good about sitting down doing the panelling. I think there'll be alot of people really interested and willing to do it, especially alot of these young kids who exert really doing things and it gives them something to do. They who aren't really doing things and it gives them something to do. They really enjoy it. They get something out of it.

Q: IS THERE ANY HOPE OF FUNDING ANYWHERE FOR THE NEW MURRI STATION

ROSS: Well what the process is right now - we've put and 'expression of interest form' to the Department of Communication, so it's a matter of finding out the whole process of getting a licence, plus we dunno exactly what their requirements are for getting that licence. So we're going to have to find out alot more information, we'll have to put alot more stuff together but we're hoping that maybe within the next 12 months we can find premises. We will have enough money shortly to set up our own studio. And once this studio's there we can broadcast via a landline on 4ZZZ (like Radio Redfern) plus if we've got our own licence, maybe from the same studio, once we had a transmitter or something we could probably transmit - do dur own broadcasting. Maybe we'll be able to throw switches to any number of stations and go to air at the same time or whatever. But once we got our own studio we're going to be able to be moving along then. I think the radio licence - that's a possibility everyone looks at us funny - I don't think they take us very serilously. I think we'll just keep on with it because we're building up enough of a group, enough of a following, enough of a basic interest, I suppose. Just getting people used to the thing of Murri time. And I think we'll keep on and won't have too many problems. Q: ARE YOU GOING TO APPLY FOR ONE OF THE LICENCES OF finding out the whole process of getting a licence, plus we dunno exactly

Q: ARE YOU GOING TO APPLY FOR ONE OF THE LICENCES OF THE NEW PUBLIC BROADCASTERS ? ROSS: Yeah, we've told them we're interested in the southside area -

so - nice big area - I dunno whether it'll come off but if not, we're going to try and talk to some other groups around the town who might be able to put in a joint submission - a couple of other groups maybe. Preferably if we can go it alone - we'll go it alone because then we have to educate ourselves.... right from the start we've said that we want a different sound - not like 4ZZZ; nor do we want to have programmes that sound like the ABC or anybody else. We want to find our own sort of stuff. You see it's sort of happening, we're not doing radio like other people. It's just a different sort of feeling when there's Murri people on air then if it's anybody else on any other station.

Q: IS THERE ANYTHING ELSE YOU'D LIKE TO SAY ?

ROSS: Well, we're not losing - we come from nothing - got eight hours a week after less than 2 years. Eight hours on air that we're getting alot of response to. No people on wages except myself and this is part of my job at childcare. We've started the process off to get our own licence plus we're hoping to get the trainees out there. And if we had a place now we could start setting up our own studio. It's just a matter of finding a place to set up. So we're doing O.K. - we're coming from nowhere and what keeps it going I think is just the fact that we're getting response.

GLENYS: And not just in the Brisbane area - we get calls from up the coast and right down across the border. Sydney. Townsville. ROSS: Sunshine Coast. Some people listen to 4 ZZZ 24 hours a day!

GLENYS: It's just good to hear Murri music. ROSS: Another time we did a graveyard shift because the announcer didn't come - and a Murri ran into me in the street and said 'Sorry brother, I had to go to sleep about 3 o'clock the other night - I couldn't stay awake with yous.'

(LAUGHTER)

ANOTHER MURRI (NAME UNKNOWN): Do the people really under-We've got our own culture stand what we're all about as being Murris. and as being in this enviroment we have to live two different lives - one as white, one as black. Do the white people really understand our culture. There is a time when we got to sit down with you and you've got to sit down with us. MICHELLE: It works both ways - not just one.

On June 6th this year we will celebrate Queensland Day. It is a day invented by the premiers department as a public relations exercise.

This year, however, the government will not be able to afford Qld Day as a senior public servant and close friend of the Premiers has embezzeled all of the funds. Corruption is always close to the Premier with Sir Edward Lyons and Allen Callaghan being amongst Sir Joh's best friends.

It has become more obvious than usual this year that Queensland Day is just another National Party fraud. We can use this day to turn the tables on the corrupt Queensland government and its big business mates. We can promote the rights of workers, women and minority groups as well as conservation, peace, freedom and fair voting rights.

For too long we have had to tolerate the excesses of a government, elected by a handfull of people to protect the interests of the rich minority.

Victims of this undemocratic and authoritarian government have been the 1000 SEQEB linesmen who were sacked because they went on strike. The loss of this dispute has allowed employers to force a 'no strike' clause on to workers in other industries.

Later in 1985 the government was responsible for the raids on the Townsville and Brisbane abortion clinics, with the illegal confiscation of 47 000 patient's personal files. Although diverting attention from the SEQEB dispute, the badly planned media stunt backfired on the government and brought about even more public disapproval.

On May 10, Sir Johannes Bjelke Peterson was to receive an honourary doctorate of Laws. That evening thousands of people demonstrated their outrage outside Mayne Hall. The Premier was unable to attend.

On May 11, sixteen people were arrested leaving a rally at Roma Street, Forum.

The Premier received his doctorate of Laws from the security of Parliment House on June 11th.

In another pathetic attempt to divert attention from its serious economic mess, the Queensland Government amended the Liquor Trades Act so as to make it illegal for a publican to serve a drink to a 'known' sexual pervert, drug addict, child molester, or deviant. Recently we have been threatened with a frightening piece of legislation known as the Drugs Misuse Bill, amongst the Bill's provisions are:- up to 15 years in jail for possession of up to 100 grams of marijuana or life in jail, with no parole for 25 years for possession of more than 100 grams of marijuana. The bill has been temporarily withdrawn but the government intends to reintroduce it later this year.

That close friend of the Premier, Sir Edward Lyons was back into the spotlight when East-West Airlines were offered a prime piece of North Queensland real estate. The Lindeman Island affair as it became known, was the high point of the year for most of us, when the Premier's plan to sell off bits of National Park to his mates, was confronted with a well organised campaign by conservation groups and individuals.

It is unfortunate that racism is still a problem in the deep north however the provocative comments made by the Premier have only served to agitate an already serious problem. When the Federal Government handed over Ayers Rock to the Aboriginals, Peterson was in Darwin with his redneck colleagues discussing the 'Aboriginal Problem'. More inflamatory remarks were made in the 'National Geographic' concerning the Aboriginal's claim to Land Rights rather; than discuss the issue intelligently he chooses to denigrate people to his own level.
