



THE AM-FM TANGO

Just when you thought that not much else could happen to radio in Brisbane, pow, something comes along to hit you between the eyes. Radio is controlled by the federal government, in the manifestation of the Minister of Transport and Communications, a post currently held by Kim Beazley. Kim is such a funny old fellow. First he de-regulates the domestic airlines and then the media starts making squeaking noises about him becoming the heir apparent to Bob. Obviously Kim is looking for more areas in which to score little leadership brownie points. The murmurings at the moment are that Kim has an eye on radio, specifically FM radio. Those nasty smelly and unprofitable public radios possess FM licences while the good wholesome commercial stations flounder in the evil realm of the AM band.

Never without an idea for turning a buck, Kim has a simple and clean solution. Make the public stations convert to AM and then sell the cleared FM band to the commercial AM stations. They are just hanging out to pay



the Federal government quite a few million dollars for the privilege.

The implications of this scheme are many and, to coin a cliche, varied. Most importantly, the public stations, due to their low income potential for the Commonwealth in the way of licence fees, are considered boat anchor. Relegation to the AM league is the simplest way of silencing around eighty stations, which have been a thorn in the government's side. In addition, the government is searching for windfall income, such as the sale of public assets including the FM band.

The perception that AM is a backwater and FM the shining light is a relatively new one. In the 70's no commercial station wanted a bar of the new technology (which had been around for forty years) leaving the new public and government stations to pioneer the better sounding new medium. In the intervening fifteen years a high proportion of listeners have acquired one or more FM receivers; many of which will not pick up AM. AM

stations are now prepared to pay millions to convert in order to grab those unprecedented ratings. The commercial AM stations are prepared to pay to overcome their previous shortsightedness while the public stations which have been successful in getting people to go FM may be made to pay for their farsightedness. From this point of view the success of public radio could be its own downfall!

The implications of being AM in a progressively FM dominated market is not merely the reverse of being FM in AM dominated 1975. With the construction of FM-only receivers the number of people any AM public station could technically reach would be severely reduced until a point would be reached where it would be economically impossible to exist. In addition, this straight swap could cause further problems with the listeners. Aged listeners will not take kindly to the discovery that their AM-only radios are now tuned to a former FM station utilising the band; while young listeners, brought up on quality FM, won't listen to new music on AM. This plan wouldn't affect the government FM stations. Is it all part of an insidious plot to get a bigger audience share for Radio Darlinghurst? Or is Kim Beazley merely trying to pay his way as Minister for Communications?

The alleged justification for turfing public stations off the FM band is that they don't utilize the stereo quality of FM. It seems absurd that some pompous fat twit from Western Australia can say that public stations don't utilize the stereo effect when he is prepared to sell the band to commercial stations that may purchase a FM licence so that they can broadcast the TAB results - in glorious stereo.

This all may sound a bit far-fetched, particularly when you consider the present FM band in Brisbane. There are four public stations, two commercial and two government - all evenly spaced 0.8 Mhz from each other. There is one space left at 102.9 Mhz which is intended for 4BH when it turns FM and another space must be allocated for the new Murri station, probably at 100.3 Mhz. What is left on the band is approximately 4Mhz of band width for about 4 stations. Plenty of room you howl, and true. But answer the next question: what happens when new FM licenses come into being not only in Brisbane but also on the Gold and Sunshine Coasts as both areas affect the Brisbane FM band's spacing. Why did 4RPH, part-public part-government station, take the old 4BK transmitter. Paranoid maybe, but better to be proven wrong, than not to raise the issue, at all.

Help to nip this outrageous suggestion in the bud. Write to your Federal MP or Kim Beazley himself, supporting the continuation of public FM licences. It won't just be 4ZZZ you'll be saving but the whole kit and caboodle from Cairns to Perth.

In the next Radio Times there will be a reprint of an interview between 3CCC and the communications support minister. Their discussion raised many of the drawbacks of the scheme.





CUSTARD - "Rockfish Anna" - 7"

Strangely recognizable, anyone who has been around Brisburg for a while will recognize a latent sound from another, to remain anonymous, Brisband.

Dave Mc Cormack high pitched "na na na na's" should be taken earnestly as they've been gigging around in various forms for many years now and have matured, or regressed, to a wonderful vinyl childhood. Their numerous gigs and airplay on Zed pushed "Rockfish Anna" to number seventy-five on the 1990 Hot 100. It's been the biggest selling local single for a few months now, being in its second pressing of 500.

The single contains four tracks, which is more than you get on most 12 inches. All are just as quirky as "Rockfish", funny guitars and na's, the B side, "C is for Cookie" containing the cutes sample.

It's a Brisbane Band, it's na na, go buy it!

SWERVEDRIVER - "Self Titled" - E.P.

By securing a distribution deal from the UK Creation label, Shock Records has made available some fab UK bands. This isn't a Creation label review but they sign such a diverse range of bands almost every release is a surprise, including Swervedriver.

Already known to Zed listeners for their Hot 100 number twenty track, "Son of Mustang Ford", their second EP "Self Titled " will probably be just as popular, though it didn't have the same wonderful (thing I couldn't find a word for) at first. After a few listens though, well yep, chunky guitars, they've got it.

It's hard to believe these guys are from the UK.

FEAR OF FALLING - "Butler" - 7"

Luckily for F.O.F., their first single rose above the hype generated by the music media. Thier 2nd single is much more laidback. Dare I say, brooding intensity on the hard side? "Butler" is dedicated to the pretentious yuppies everywhere (yes?!!). Energy, vitality, ambition and enthusiasm abound, but it's sometimes difficult to understand what's going on. "Butler" suffers from cloying vocals. A very pleasing 2nd effort, the third has been promised "a corker". World domination from Brisbane????

REDD CROSS - "Third Eye" - L.P.

Available since October 1990, this album has sadly not received the rotation it should at Zed.

Some claim this is not as good as previous releases, but as Redd Cross only came to my notice on the "Every Band has a Shonen Knife Who Loves Them" compilation, I can't really say either way except that the previous ones must have been darn good.

Third Eye is a broad collection of guitary tunes, from the bubble gum poppy "Bubble Gum Factory", (appropriately named), to snorking guitar bashing tracks like "Annies Gone" and "Shonen Knife". This brings us to the great question of life, why are so many bands obsessed with Shonen Knife, a Japanese girl pop band? (Anyone who can answer this, write to the Editor of Radio Times)

This album wasn't released locally, unlike their last, so you'll have to hit the usual stores for a copy.

NIRVANA - "Silver" - 7"

Remember when you heard the chorus of Ratcat's "That Ain't Bad" kick in? That thump in your head that bruised your kidneys. As Kurt sings over the opening bassline, the band gets impatient, and mid-line - POW! Everything rocks as tales of childhood are howled. You'll never think of your grandparents in the same light....Awesome.....and the phone call is funny too!

ANDY PRIEBOY - "Upon My Wicked Son" - L.P.

Somewhat of a surprise, is this one. For those of you who tired of Wall of Voodoo, this is a wonderful piece of work. For the beginner, this LP is a slice of honest, refreshing, heart felt worldview, via some of the most concise lyrics you'll hear in a while. Low-key production means that the work is uncluttered. Andy speaks of AIDS (Wendy), gay-bashing ignorami (Voice), shallow people (N.Y. Debut of L.A. Artist), torment (Highwayman), faith (Montezuma), male hormones (To The Dogs), and of course the big L(ove). This, however, is not a depressing album. Hear it and weep, laugh, sigh for relief, whatever. An album for the discerning.

This has been an unusually difficult story to put to paper. The sheer size of the Prices Surveillance Authority's (PSA) report into the "...Prices of Sound Recordings", is a major deterrent. To compound this the majority of record companies, you know who you are, were unusually media shy when questioned about their opinions concerning the PSA report. Finally, this is such a complex issue that these few words can barely do the subject justice.

- · that prices of sound recordings are too high
- · that the importation restrictions on overseas sound recordings be removed to allow greater competition
- · that a 2% performers levy on record prices be introduced to fund the development of Australian Artists
- · that Australian artists have greater control over their copyright

The inquiry was sparked by the anomaly between the Australian and overseas prices for sound recordings. Anyone who has purchased music overseas would have been dumfounded by the great range and significantly lower cost of sound recordings, even those of Aust. ar-


The solution offered by the PSA report is to abolish the importation restrictions in place, known as parallel importation. Legislation currently makes illegal the unauthorized importation and sale of sound recordings on which the copyright is held by another party. The copyright to almost all sound recordings is held be the major labels; EMI, CBS, WEA, BMG, Polygram and others and this gives them a legal monopoly over the Australian music buying market. The PSA reasons the abolition of the parallel importation restrictions will open the market to competition from anyone who cares to import records and that there will be a resulting 25%-30% drop in the cost of sound recordings. RECORD PRICES REVIEW

As a brief background, on the 15th of February 1990, the PSA was given permission to conduct an inquiry into the prices of sound recordings, that is, to determine if the prices of cassettes, records and CD's are too high and if so why? On the 18th Dec 90, the PSA released it's report and its findings included:

up to seven or eight dollars when buying local releases.

s could be expected, the major labels are more than a Jittle upset at this potential threat to their profits. Due to the reluctance of these labels to discuss the report, their objectives are vague but the defence of the sound recording prices is based on the size, or lack, of the Australian record buying market. The high prices are necessary to maintain the Australian industry. If there were a cut in profits there would automatically be a reduction in spending on the development of Australian performers (I hesitate to call them artists due to their distinct lack of talent). These performers are not the likes of alternative bands, these are left to the indie labels to foster and are then poached once they achieve popularity. The performers in question are the likes of the entire Countdown Revolution cast, Collette, Kylie and Tina Arena, some of whom prove enormously successful, but the majority of whom flop. You pay for the bad judgement of the major labels signing performers. Less profit will mean less money for the local recording industry, which means the major labels will have to demonstrate some taste in signing artists.

The PSA report could also directly affect the alternative import record buying market, which is probably you. Nobody in this market knows

what will happen since the report's recommendations will be implemented after cabinet discussion and after representations to the Minister from many of the bodies involved in the PSA inquiry. Even though the mainstream product would become cheaper, it is generally accepted that as alternative music is a specialty market there will not be similar reductions. The alternative product that is released locally by the major labels may be cheaper, but anything from independent labels and import shops will remain at its current price because of the insignificant size of the market.

urrently the major labels manufacture their product in Australia and their monopoly allows them to charge the prices they do. But if a product can be imported cheaper by the retailers, than the major labels can manufacture and sell with their markup, then the major labels will have to cut their profits to remain competitive. Added to this, larger stores like Brashes could bulk buy, further reducing the cost.

For the indie labels, a reduction in the price of the major label's records will not result in a drop in the price of their products. Indie labels have a smaller market and hence smaller production runs, meaning higher costs in manufacturing. Added to this are their proportionally higher distribution and promotion costs with less return on their sales. Also as their market is not yet CD friendly,

the decline of vinyl adds to their problems. The difference in price will result in less profits for the indie labels, as the record buyer chooses between records of differing prices, resulting in the possible demise or absorption of the indie labels by the majors.

he abolition of importation restrictions will allow everyone to import records. Mega stores, like Brashes, with their greater buying power will then not only import commercial stock but could also make moves on the alternative market by importing the big selling alternative hits from overseas, under-cutting the import shops. The import shops must either specialize in a market niche or perish.

ltimately, you, the record buying public will determine the future of the sound recording market. The dollar is a powerful weapon when used effectively, if the demand for vinyl had not been as strong as it was, or still is, CD's would have taken over the market in the early eighties. Similarly, if the demand for indie music is strong then not only will the indie labels and import shops continue to exist and make it available to you, but the major labels may need to take a look at themselves and reform their practices.

It is 1991, and in much of Western civilization the minority is oppressed on the basis of popular opinion and social knowledge. With the cinema being one of the most popular forms of entertainment in the 1930's, it is not surprising that there evolved filmic texts which dealt with the use of illegal drugs and the subsequent dissolution of the human character. Though now regarded as a cult classic "Reefer Madness" was intended to reveal the heinous influence of marijuana.

Ostensibly based on a true story the film follows the experiences of Mary, Bill and Jimmy as they descend into the murky marijuana underworld. Initially they are invited back to a dealer's house for a party, where they are introduced to the drug - however the dealers are not charitable hosts but evil merchants trying to turn the innocent teenagers into reefer addicts. At first reefers are nothing more than a bit of fun, but before long their soul destroying powers take hold. A stoned sex-crazed gangster

Deviance, You and What To Do

Hence we should ask ourselves an important question. If "deviant" behaviour is so rampant why is it often enshrouded in a maze of Draconian laws and punishments?

tries to rape Mary, Jimmy has a toke too many and runs over an old man in his car, while Bill is framed for murder by the evil drug dealers.

Indeed the main theme of the film is that of the casual relationship between marijuana usage and crime. In a scene featuring concerned headmaster Dr Carrol and Federal Agent Wyatt this motif is humourously obvious.

Wyatt: Here is an example. A 16 year old lad ap-

prehended in the act of staging a hold-up. Sixteen years old and a marijuana addict. Here is the most tragic case.

Carrol: Yes, I remember. Just a young boy. Under the influence of the drug he killed his entire family with an axe.


