Brisbane is an exceedingly physically pleasant place to be in, and I am pleased to be working at ZZZ where my mouldy geriatric feminist consciousness might be forced to approach some form of dialectic.

I am religiously reading books about rock and that is all very well but there is room for romantic schmaltz and storytelling, aware as we are of the mythification of love, and the underpinnings of capitalist patriarchies. It is a great temptation to jump boots and all into an instant revolutionising of radio form and techniqueand do away with all the male and capitalist tendencies and methods.

The baby and the bathwater. Change is slow and painful, not an armageddon unfortunately. So saying, she softshoeshuffled into the gentle art of compromise whistling, there are more ways to skin a cat, and if you haven't got a back they can't stab you, and what a delightful way to grow mad and old listening to freddy fender singing "waste days and wasted nights" .... With that in mind, I intend to devote two shows this month to contemporary jaz.

"The claim of exclusive validity for European harmonics is contradicted not only by artistic and physical considerations, but also by the many different principles and systems which have proven their value in other musical cultures of the world. Especially in view of today's political and cultural developments the contention has become irrelevant that one system would have all the answers. On the other hand, it remains to be seen to what extent the free harmonic conception is the answer. It is not correct, however, to simply invalidate this conception as "incomprehensible", since it is a fact that it was immediately understood without prior discussion by a minority of listeners and a majority of young jazz musicians all over the world." Jaochim Berendt, author of "The Jazz Book".

"The cry often goes up that this music is not jaz. Fine. But then it is obviously not straight music, because of its feeling and the emphasis on improvisation. The plain truth of the matter would seem to be that here is a genuinely new music with an identity of its own ... No one in the media seems prepared to give it an outlet. The rock/pop establishment can't make enough quick money out of it, the jazz establishement has trouble enough keeping its head above water. And the straight establishement seems loath to admit that anything outside their own tradition can be recognised as serious music." Howard Riley, english pianist.

## BLUES

### NOTHIN' BUT THE BLUES

May 4: Battle of the Harps - In the red corner we have Little Walter, with his assortment of weapons, including the giant 64 reed chromatic, versus Big Walter with his Marine Band harps. Little Walter managed to drink himself to a premature death in 1968 (he died after a fight) and Big Walter is apparently still trying. But they are both great harp players.

May 11: Australian Blues - Australian Blues bands are about as rare as cuttlefish in Lake Eyre, but when they do surface, they're usually good. The prime example is Chain, now defunct, and the best band presently working is the Foreday Riders in Sydney. We'll take a look at their new album, which is excellent, and also at Dutch Tilders' new album.

<u>May 18</u>: People you haven't heard before, but certainly should have by this time. There are lots of important personages that we've only played in an accompanying role, or even worse, not at all. Will probably turn into an interesting cross section of Blues.

<u>May 25</u>: A look at the Chess label. This was (until sold last year) the principal blues label in Chicago. They started just after the war, and the rise of Chicago blues society is inextricably bound up with Chess. Some classic sides by Muddy Waters, Howling Wolf, Jimmy Rogers, John Brim, Elmor James and many others.

On the future of the Blues - Brownie McGhee during an interview while in Brisbane "The Blues will never die. As long as you got a man and a woman, and you got problems, that's where the blues is. But you can't expect my son, who's 23, to play the same way they were playing 50 years ago."

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## PROGRAMME NOTES BRISBANE LINE

Some Sunday afternoons it's possible to hear the same sounding footy commentators making the same comments about the state of play in the same football match on five of Brisbane's seven A.M. radio stations.

News coverage is sparse and when it appears between the sports writers droolings, it is itself concerned with the latest sports developments. Sometimes, if vou're lucky, you might hear the odd so called Top Forty record before it's back to Lang Park.

Not any more folks!

Brisbane Line was started with the intention of providing the triple zed audience with detailed informed comment on current affairs. While the A.B.C.'s T.D.T. gives you heroic accounts of their reporters' fearless exposes on how to bake wholemeal bread, and the commercials recycle Haydn Sargent, Brisbane Line has been trying to seek out the News behind The News.

The programme is put together by a combination of journalists, station staff and volunteers from the University's Journalism Department. It operates on no budget, with limited equipment, and works out of one of the tiny disc jockey studios.

In spite of these rather limited conditions, Brisbane Line has broken major stories including the beating of a Wolston Park inmate by attendants, and the impending collapse of several building societies.

Brisbane Line was the only Queensland news outlet which reported in full on the winding up of the Australian Co-operative Society, naming the people involved.

The programme's reporters regularly get exclusive interviews with leaders in Government and industry ... the real thing...not just the stage managed news conferences attended by the socalled professional media. News releases are discussed and analysed...not just slightly re-written and presented as news.

Because that's what it is, News...written and presented by the reporters themselves ...not just identical stories ripped off a telex machine and read by different sounding disc jockeys pretending they have their own independent newsroom to back them up. If you don't believe me, get your push button car radio and sweep across the dial at news time on commercial radio. Count the identical stories.

In the near future, things look far from bleak. "The Brisbane Line" is indeed expansionist and intends drawing in more qualified people, establishing a research unit and creating new methodologies in the media. Stay tuned.

BRUCKNER: Symphony No. 8 Berlin Philharmonic, Karayan IC 187-00763/4

The symphonies of Bruckner are not noted for their brevity: The eighth is his second last and longest. The finale is certainly his longest movement. Klemperer said of it "In this instance it seems to me that the composer was so full of musical invention that he went too far. Brucknerians will object and it is certainly not my intention that those comments should be considered as a model for others. I can only take responsibility for my own interpretation."

The Karayan version is complete, of course, and his tempi are deliciously slow ... a cauton to the uncomm itted!

BEETHOVEN: Symphony No. 5. Vienna Philharmonia/ Carlos Klieber DGG A new interpretation by a widely acclaimed young conductor and son of Eric Klieber.

BEETHOVEN: Sonata Op. 57 "Appasionata" Suvatoslav Richter (PNO) RCA VICS -1427 Still regarded as the classic performance on record of this work, recorded in 1961, at the time when Richter was first being heard by stunned audiences in the West.

<u>PRAELORIUS</u>: Excerpts from Terpsichore (1612), Early Music Consort CSD 3761 (EMI) Unlike most music of this period which was inspired or reflected by pious religious values this music is gutsy and wonderfully earthy and almost vulgar. ## **4ZZZ HIGH POWER**

### 4ZZZFM, GOING TO HIGH POWER, AND YOU

As we go to press we are still finalising use date at which we go to full power (i.e. 10 KW). While many of us will be looking forward to the huge improvement in power and serviced area most people working at the station are equally, if not more, concerned that the station should greatly improve the quality of its programmes at the same time.

The faults of the station are quite obvious to those working for the station, as it is too our listeners. The station is too humourless, the political values the station espouses are often crude and boringly presented, the station has lacked consistency in its programming, too many studio foulups, a need for more call signs to supplement our Carol Lloyd call sign. Most importantly the station needs a greater number of well produced specials ranging from musical biographies to socio/political programmes on issues like sexuality, nuclear power etc.

Much of the stations' time is now spent working on how these problems can be overcome. For instance on a couple of days recently we played albums all day long so we could discuss problems and programme ideas. Hopefully the fruit of these labours will become apparent when the station goes to full power. We are currently working on a variety of new programmes which will go to air at that time. In the meantime we will be endeabouring to improve the stations' current performance. Much of this work is being supervised by the stations' new Programme Co-ordinator Haydn Thompson.

One of the major problems facing the station is that of a lack of volunteer helpers. For example many of the fulltime staff trying to produce programmes find themselves spending large parts of the day answering the telephone, stamping records, mailing out Radio Times, etc.

2JJ have a staff of over 50, 2SM have 83 and the ABC access station in Melbourne, 3ZZ which broadcasts around 40 hours of material a week has a staff of 20, 4ZZZ-FM broadcasting 83 hours a week has 12 fulltime staff.

We currently need volunteer helpers for two basic areas: (1) We need people to perform various office and programme duties during the hours of 9am to 6 pm. (11) We need people willing to do the unskilled building and construction work on Mt. Cootha. We need these people during the daylight hours during the week and/or at weekends.

Of the first group the work is both clerical and routine (switchboard, record stamping, etc.) or creative (researching, interviewing, etc.). For all types of office volunteers we especially need people who can come regularly (i.e. at a fixed time each week.)

Finally we desperately need office furniture. If you have any old tables, especially ones with drawers, cupboards with drawers or shelving, or filing cabinets, they will be gratefully received.

From 8.30 to 9 pm there will be a live three discussion about broadcasting. It is hoped that Marius Webb will be in 2JJ's Sydney studios to join in.

The whole deal has been initiated by 3ZZ co-ordinator Mark Georgiou and represents an important example of co-operative broadcasting that 4ZZZ hopes to further cultivate down the East coast of Australia and further west.

P.S. By the way 3ZZ pinched the ZZ bit from us, even though they went to air before 4ZZZ-FM.

### SPECIALS

As you are probably aware 4ZZ-FM will be going to 'high power' in the space of a few weeks. With this in mind, the production side of the station has begun to gear itself to this end. What this means is that 4ZZ7 will attempt to work on 'special' programmes that hopefully will present new material in a new form, or old material with a new perspective. We want to use sound in creative ways to present material which has been seen as the province of film and television journalists - it's almost like trying to present images through sound and retain at least some of the complexity of the written word without losing the threads halfway through.

The subjects of these programmes will range from the mass media as an industry to (yet another) look at sexuality, the fast food business, Nuclear Power, Disney on Parade and a lot of other things.

Obviously ZZZ has always problems with resources, particularly volunteer research staff, straight information as well as equipment. I am hoping that by establishing what we're working on in advance, volunteer research people will be able to find an area that they know something about or are greatly interested in. Thus they will be able to find a starting point in the station instead of getting pissed off with the bureaucratic problems that the station still has to cope with at this stage.

Another problem arising from the shortages of staff and time has been that ZZZ has never fully investigated recorded material already available - i.e. satirical records, comedy records, records of speeches by various politicos etc. If anyone has any ideas or material available, I urge them to get in contact with me. Also, if anyone has had any experinece in radio documentary work, using music in that context, creating impressions with sound - all those kind of things would add an element of creativity we really need.

Myself and others have made attempts at these kinds of ideas - e.g. with the Joh Show, the Ulster Special, the Rocky Horror Show and others. I feel as othes that we still have a long way to go in production technique. However, ZZZ has one major advantage, BOITO: Mephistofele Selections - Ghiavrov and Tagliavini. ## TECHNICAL NOTES

Yes folks it's finally happened, 4ZZZ's high power transmitter has arrived. Not only the transmitter but also other goodies such as stereo generators, compressor amplifiers, technical monitors and stereo tape cartridge units. To cap it off, we have been given a lease on a small plot of land on Mt. Cootha to site the transmitter and aerial.

The new equipment will be gradually phased into our operation and depending on the delivery date of a tower to support the new aerial it is hoped to put the high power transmstter to air from Mt. Cootha sometime in June. At this time stereo coverage of all Brisbane and mono coverage to the north of Brisbane will be realised. Unfortunately because of the nature of the site on Mt. Cootha, coverage to the Gold Coast will be very poor.

For those who are technically inclined, here are some details of the equipment.

Transmitter - SINTRONIC DFM-3K-A capable of 3KW output power and incorporating a direct F.M. exciter and amodel SCG-9 switching type stereo generator. The distortion of this combination is roughly 0.25% with a signal to noise ratio of 66 decibels. Stereo separation is a minimum of 48 decibels over the entire audio range.

Compressor/Limiter Amplifiers - MARTI CLA-40A. These beasts are capable of a 40 decibel dynamic control range but we hope to use no more than 10 decibels of compression on most programme material and may even consider switching out the compression on special programmes as these compressors do introduce about 0.1 distortion. A 50us pre/de-emphasis system is incorporated in the compressors to enable maximum modulation of the transmitter without over deviation. Technical Monitors - BELAR FMN-1 and FMS-1. The combination of these two monitors permits monitoring of virtually all technical parameters of the transmitted multiplex signal.

Programme Off-Air Monitor - YAMAHA CT-7000. A truly remarkable tuner; after using and listening to one you realise why it has acquired a reputation as the worlds best F.M. tuner. With distortion at an incredible 0.03%, capture ratio of 0.5 db, signal to noise ratio of 75 decibels, intermodulation better than 90 db at 800 KHz spacing, separation better than 40 decibels over the entire audio range it is certainly not the limiting factor in listening to an F.M. broadcast.

We have the equipment, but there is still a great deal of work to be done in putting it into operation and a great deal of money to be spent in the process - so please let your friends know that 4ZZZ is worthy of their physical and financial support.



The March issue of Radio Times featured our pronouncement to expose and concentrate on the Queensland Mental Health issue. We did just that, with items throughout the month and interviews at length with concerned people including Health minister Llew Edwards, Paul Wilson, Jim Gardiner, Jack Dah (Hospitals Employees Union secretary), Pam Gorring (Mental Health Association president), Wolston Park employees and a host of others.

ZZZ was the only Brisbane media organ to reveal details of the case of a patient who was beaten up by staff a Wolston Park last year, following the tactic by the Mental Health Association to distribute documents of the case pluse correspondence with Health minister Edwards to all State members of Parliament. Following our detailed analysis of the case, the Fairfax paper "The National Times" ran a double page story with similar information, if watered down.

ZZZ broadcast details of shock therapy and its effects in "The Brisbane Line", and hope that our listeners realise the seriousness of conditions in Queensland mental institutions.

4ZZZ presumes it will play an increasingly important role in influencing other local media by pioneering issues, ideas and alternate concepts in programming. Notice how the Courier Mail is now beginning to push the Mental Health issue with its daily case history studies (not as heavy as the inquiry-into-the-policeforce lobby, but nevertheless a beginning.)

The production staff at ZZZ always attempt to be publicly accessible, technically creative and politically poignant, but realise the inadequacies existing at the station at the moment (shortage of fulltime staff necessitate absurdly large workloads on us which leads to occasional inadequate investigation of material and seeking outside help). If you can criticise, please do. Consumer straight-talk can only cater for people if consumer feedback exists.

Duster Bennet is dead. He was driving a car in England and his car was involved in an accident with a truck. Bennet was the first person interviewed on ZZZ. At the time, last December, he was touring Australia as a solo (veteran illues singer) support singer with Skyhooks. Duster Bennet's last album was "Fingertips". Also interviewed the same evening was Red Symons of Skyhooks. So it goes.

RECORD REVIEW : RETURN TO FOREVER

ROMANTIC WARRIOR ALBUM : PERSONNEL : CHIC K COREA (KEYBOARDS) STANLEY CLARKE (BASS GUITAR) LENNY WHITE (DRUMS & PERCUSSION) AL DIMEOLA (GUITARS) LABEL : CBS/PC 34076

This is the first time I have reviewed a record of the Return to Forever as a whole. I have heard both records which Stanley Clarke has released, various albums by Lenny White and the amazing album by Al Dimeola, Land of the Midnight Sun.

I can only say that the combination of these three in one band is mind-boggling. They all have considerable mastery over their instruments and this is shown in this new album.

Although you could say that their music sounds all the same, that could suggest superficial enjoyment of R.T.F. music. On this album all the songs have an underlying theme which then allows great freedom for improvisation.

The influences in the songs are hard to trace. I, at least, have no idea of who influences whom. The example in this album is the song Romantic Warrior which to me sounds very much like John Abercrombie's style of playing, using very strong but tasteful phrases. But could Al Dimeola have influenced John?

The sound in the album is very well rounded, it's no wonder that the RTF people have put special thanks to the recording engineers (Dennis Mackay, Tom Likes) in the liner notes. There are things like very faint phasing of the drums, which add to the overall production.

Also on the album is the first appearance of the Polymor, which is a great breakthrough in moog synthesisers because up to now their keyboards have been incapable of playing more than one note at a time. But now things have changed, and a multiple number of notes can be sustained.

As you can gather, I haven't told you very much about this album. The best thing I can say is buy it, it's worth it.

### RECORD REVIEW - THE ROLLING STONES "BLACK AND BLUE".

As Mick Jagger once said - Narcissism is the normal motivation - and it appears that on "Black and Blue" Jagger and the Stones have let their heads go and done just what they felt like doing. The album is a collection of unusual material which, in my opinion, leaves their old trad. rock and roll stuff for dead. A quick run through



of the tracks shows us that the group has matured in its musical taste. Of course this process has been going on since 1973, when the Stones released "Goat's Head Soup". This showed the start of a gradual progression away from' 'guts' rock and roll.

### To their new release -

As its title suggests "Black and Blue" is a mixture of Stones-modified and particularly Jagger-modified soul and blues numbers, some of which work out and others which really are a great disappointment. "Hot Stuff" and Cherry Oh Baby" are strong reggae numbers but such a departure from the Stones' image that I am afraid many of the old Stones ' gang' will be alienated immediately. "Hand of Fate" features the powerful Jagger vocals that we all know and love. Wayne Perkins on guitar makes a fitting debut on this track and seems to fit in well with the overall sound of the group, which I am happy to say has lost none of its brilliance, tightness and energy.

"Memory Motel" is definitely my favourite track. Its country-blues beat is pleasant and the lyrics (Jagger and Richard) are splendid. "Hey Negrita" and "Melody" are soul tracks in which lagger comes off second best to accompanist Billy Preston who is, of course, much more at home with this sort of beat.

"Fool to Cry" was cutsie and "Crazy Mama" rounded off the album in typical Stones fashion. My overall impression was that Jagger is testing himself in different mediums on this album. It is definitely a classy piece and the Stones deserve ten points for trying. But overall it is more important as a sign of the shape of things to come.

### AND A DIFFERENT VIEW

A recent American industry music report shows that the fastest growing recording buying market is the 25-45 age group.

These statistics fit pretty well with the fact that the vast majority of the aesthetically and commercially successful performers are well over the age of 25, like the Rolling Stones.

The trendiness of the inclusion of a reggae track becomes quite ridiculous when in 1 fact "Cherry Oh Baby" is a simple pop reggae tune from 1970, faithfully covered. If the Stones had reconstructed Neil Diamond's "Song Sung Blue" it would be no more comprehensible.

But all is forgiven with the seemingly casual jazz influenced "Melody", which for the Stones is hugely adventurous and which emerges as the stand-out track on "Black and Blue".
