oxby Downs, 500 km north-west of Adelaide, potentially the world's largest deposit of uran-m. Surprisingly, the mine is jointly owned by vo multinationals; Western Mining Corporation d British Petroleum.

Uranium miners and their families are subject bruch higher rates of lung cancer and loukemia ian the general population; there are no safe vels of exposure to radiation. Miners at Roxby re not informed of individual levels of exposure. Roxby Downs will also create 400 hectares f radioactive waste tailings. The tailings will be tored in 30 metre-high containers, will be danger-usly radioactive for hundreds of thousands of ears, and will contaminate the soil, water, plants, nimals and people in the area.

Australia has no guarantee that the uranium from Roxby, enough for 400 Hiroshimas per year, will not be used for nuclear weapons. The myth of the "peaceful atom" was exploded in 1982 when Reagan announced that the US military would purchase plutonium from civilian nuclear reactors. The mining companies have ignored an indep-endant anthropological report prepared for the Kokatha people, the traditional owners of the area. Already, sacred sites have been destroyed by the main mine shaft. It is because of a loophole in Labor Party policy is able to proceed; uranium is mined along with other minerals. Despite the fact that the ALP is committed to the phasing-out of uranium mining, Hawke is talking of granting two new export licenses, to the Ranger and Narbalek mines. The Roxby blockade, held from August 27 to September 4, was designed to block supply to the mine and to publicise the issues of radioactive hazards, Land Rights, employment and the envir-onment.

It was a non-violent, direct action blockade and, despite reports in the media, none of the principles of non-violence were transgressed. The assumption underlying non-violent action is that the power of any government depends on the goodwill, consent and co-operation of the people governed. The Roxby blockade was successful in drawing attention to the dangers of the mine and the strong opposition of many people to uranium mining in Australia.
